# **Boston Early Music Festival Report**

It was a difficult and exhilarating experience to perform at the Boston Early Music Festival this year. First of all, I was assured I would see many west coast faces. I did not. I did know enough people so that I did not feel totally adrift. It was wonderful to see Ed Kottick and to be involved with the Zuckermann room at the festival. Zuckermann representatives were most gracious hosts and the instruments performed on were top quality. particularly good about my concert because of the rather large percentage of young people (under the age of 30) who attended. As with most early music festivals, the attendees were generally in their 50's -70's. As I am dedicated to the continuation of our instruments and their glorious sounds, it was gratifying that youth were attracted to the sounds of today on the instruments of yesterday and today. I say that because, with all due respect, the instruments themselves are younger than we are. I played a fantastic Flemish single manual that was having its debut!!

The only difficulty I experienced was the awful weather. It began at 94 degrees and 100 per cent humidity and dropped to 54 degrees and cold rain.

There were some lovely events presented, but, in general, I felt the festival could have been more engaging – an impression shared by other attendees who had also attended prior Boston festivals. Well, I did my best to liven things up. I certainly met the most WONDERFUL builders and heard the most divine instruments, from Richard Kingston's to Gerald Self's. And wonderful Richard Calhoun made it just in time for my gig!

# Baroque Opera Workshop Big Success in Seattle

A weeklong workshop entitled *Accademia d'Amore* took place in Seattle this past August. The course, directed by lutenist Stephen Stubbs, offered advanced singers and continuo players the opportunity to work on musical and dramatic aspects of 17th century opera with a faculty of fine specialists. For the previous eight years the workshop had taken place at the *Hochschule für Künste* in Bremen; this was the first time the event was held in Seattle.

The workshop's culminating performance consisted of eighteen staged scenes from operas by Monteverdi, Rossi, Sartorio and Landi, as well as selected scenes from Purcell's *The Fairy Queen* and *King Arthur*. Harpsichordist and WEKA member Jillon **Dupree**, who served on the continuo faculty, reported on the amazingly professional level of the performance, for which students had only five days of intensive study to prepare. Not only was the acting and vocal quality at a very high level, but the accompanying instrumental ensemble, which consisted of both faculty and students playing on violins, viols, harps, lutes, organ, and harpsichords, pulled together nearly three hours of complicated repertoire with remarkable artistry.

The course was presented with the help of the Seattle Early Music Guild and took place at Seattle Pacific University. Nearly fifty students attended from all over the United States and Canada, drawn to a large degree by Mr. Stubbs' reputation as a musician, recording artist and director. In addition to Mr. Stubbs and Ms. Dupree, faculty members included Nancy Zylstra (vocal coach), Maxine Eilander (harp and continuo), George Shangrow (stage accompanist), Ingrid Matthews Margriet Tindemans (viola da gamba), as well as three stage directors, Roger Hyams, Anna Mansbridge and Theodore Deacon. Given the success of the course, Accademia d'Amore is likely to see repeat performances in the years ahead!
